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Note from TCF Canada President

I would like to congratulate all our supporters for the growth of our programs and the impact we have had together in 2022. This was a year of tumult and celebration in the wake of climate emergency in the shape of floods in Pakistan and global pandemic relief. Our programs responded to the changing world with agility while maintaining our mission in clear sight; to provide quality education to children in underprivileged communities.

During the year TCF Canada stepped up and expanded its outreach and took on more school operations and build projects resulting in providing education to around 25,000 children. I am confident, with your support, we can continue to increase the scale of our impact in schools and communities at large, and on the local front, through our Youth Bursary Program.

The floods affected 33 million people in Pakistan in summer of 2022 and engulfed our communities and damaged some of our schools. We stood with our communities in this time of acute crises with a call-to-action through TCF Canada's Flood Relief Program. The long-term impact for marginalized communities during such calamities cannot be overlooked and the education crisis has deepened with more children out of school than before and hence it is more crucial than ever for us to continue to serve and support communities as per our mission.

I did multiple visits to TCF Pakistan; visiting schools and meeting teachers and admin staff besides joining teacher appreciation/recognition event and principal annual reviews. The highlight was of course meeting students in their classes and listening to their exchanges with teachers. Several discussions were also held with TCF Pakistan management to review workflows, process improvements and ongoing new school build projects. Another key focus was to work with our independent third-party service provider, IPSOS, who conduct inspections for every school we support, to ensure quality reporting for each school unit.

It gives me great honor to share that we were again selected as the Top 10 Impact Charity and Top 10 International Charity with a five-star rating by Charity intelligence Canada in 2022. I look forward to carrying on the torch for 2023, forging ahead with hope and determination to continue to help transform communities through quality education.

Background

Pakistan currently holds the "world's second-highest number of out-of-school children," according to UNICEF (2022), equating to about 22.8 million children. It also goes on to say, 'Disparities based on gender, socio-economic status, and geography are significant'. The Citizens Foundation Canada's (TCF) mandate responds to the socio-economic inequity in accessing education by building campus-built schools in communities in-need.

The Citizens Foundation, Canada (TCF Canada) was founded in 2004 with the objective of supporting and increasing access to formal, high-quality education for underprivileged children, in Pakistan (and recently in Canada, through the Youth Bursary Program) with a focus on gender equality. It achieves its international development goal with the help of its partner and intermediary The Citizens Foundation Pakistan (TCF). TCF is a professionally managed, non-profit organization set up in 1995 to bring about positive social change through education in Pakistan. After 28 years, TCF is now one of Pakistan's leading organizations in the field of education for the less privileged.

TCF Canada has over the years hugely grown in impact and by end of 2022 is supporting 150 schools that provide quality education to around 25,000 children in underprivileged areas in Pakistan. Furthermore, we have in total completed 60 School Build projects. Our steady growth has only been possible due to the support of our generous and committed donor body.



Finance and Audit

TCF Canada's Finance team, Administration Manager and a part time consultant manage all transactions and financial operations of TCF Canada. TCF Canada is audited by Ernst & Young LLP every year and its audited financial statements for past 14 years are available on our website.

Management

The President is selected from among the board of directors and performs his role pro-bono. Operational execution takes place through a small team of staff which increased from two to three, to cater to our growth, in October 2022.

The staff is responsible for areas of development, operations, and administration.

We also have a robust body of national volunteers that work with us for a minimum of one year. They currently hold thirteen key positions in Finance, IT, Marketing, HR, and our Youth Bursary Program teams and work closely with the staff. Our oldest National Volunteer has been with us from the time of TCF Canada's inception in 2004.

Our YouthCan program provides support to our student chapters in fourteen universities for raising awareness about TCF Canada through a volunteer coordinator. The current university chapters are at U Calgary, MRU, YU, UTMET UofT, UG, UW, QU, WLU Wilfred Laurier University, BU, MAC, Western and UBC

Chapter Leads

TCF Canada has ten chapters: Vancouver, Fort McMurray, London, Calgary, Saskatoon, Regina, Toronto, Durham, Montreal, and Ottawa. The chapters are supported by a large group of dedicated local volunteers under the leadership of chapter leads (also volunteers) who organize fundraising and awareness raising events in the form of galas, sports tournaments (golf and cricket) and information sessions, etc. in coordination with the TCF Head Office team. They also provide the key link between local donors and the Head Office team.



2022: In Review

2022 brought about a few events that shaped some of the strategy and activity within TCF Canada. Post-Covid world saw the lifting of restrictions followed by a flurry of activities as we moved from virtual events to back to in-person events. Over 2,500 people attended our 5 Galas, 2 Fundraisers, Appreciation event, Bowling, and Golf events in our chapters across the country. Eight persons, that include donors, directors, chapter leaders, and TCF Canada management visited TCF schools and engaged with staff and children as well as held meetings with TCF Pakistan management (our intermediary in Pakistan).

With the impact of COVID on education not yet behind us, in June 2022, floods hit Pakistan resulting in massive devastation. With one third of Pakistan underwater, flood waters affected 33 million people, 1 million homes and 2 million acres of crop. This resulted in 3.5 million children facing a learning disruption due to the flood crisis. With our school communities submerged in water and some school buildings impacted by the flood water, TCF Canada provided support through its Flood Relief Project. The project had a three-pronged approach; meals to families, reconstruction of livelihoods and rehabilitation of schools. TCF Canada disbursed \$600,000 for relief of flood affected people and for rehabilitation. Although education was impacted in certain places for a brief period, learning in all our schools resumed after a short interval with timely intervention. The relief work was centered in our school communities, but we were able to provide aid to communities as far as 40 km away from our schools.

2022 was also the year of initiating our Youth Bursary Program for Canadian students to support our local community in Canada- our mission to provide financial assistance for education of youth facing financial challenges. 5 bursaries of \$4000 each were disbursed for the academic year 2022-2023 with a significantly enhanced program planned for the year 2023.

We were again selected as the Top 10 Impact Charity as well as the Top 10 International Charity of Canada by Charity Intelligence Canada for 2022 with a five-star ranking. We are pleased to retain our name on the list over three consecutive years. We feel a deep sense of responsibility to continue to be transparent and impactful in the donations entrusted to us by discerning donors with an expectation that we deliver on our mission efficiently.

Our core work of providing formal education (Elementary and Secondary) in communities in need in Pakistan further expanded from supporting 123 schools in 2021 to 150 schools at the end of the year 2022 (split between 116 Primary and 34 secondary school units). We completed building another three schools bringing our total to 60 new school builds. Through our continuous fundraising efforts and the huge response from our donor community against our Flood Relief appeal, TCF Canada raised revenues of almost \$4.9 million in 2022.

Our Programs

Our core programs are School Operations and Builds. Within that, for ensuring quality through upgrades, we implemented digital learning and early childhood programming to our classrooms in 2022 onwards.






Breakdown of Core Program Costs

TCF empowers girls and women in TCF communities by providing an educational model that is compatible with communities and solutions that result in transformational change.


Goal 4: Connecting Schools with Community


Schools are not walled forts, and neither can development projects be successful in isolation. TCF has developed projects that have been a response to the needs of its communities and the families of the students.


Goal 5: Preparing students for the next step


2022 Specific Projects/Programs; Progress and Impact

Within the larger framework of school operations and builds, TCF in 2022 implemented specific programs to enrich learning; Early Years Program and Digital Literacy Program (Identified in 2021 Annual Report). There were also two new programs executed this year. The Flood Relief Program, a one-time relief operation that was a response to communities and schools impacted by the floods in August 2022 in Pakistan. And our Youth Bursary Program which was initiated to support local students in Canada enrolled in undergraduate program with financial needs.

Education: The Key to Positive Change for a TCF Student



As the school bell rings, most children at the TCF School in the village Adilpur, Jacobabad, make their way home. But Dost Ali is not one of them. This eleven-year-old still has a long day ahead of him. In the scorching heat, Dost Ali unfailingly shows up at the bike repair shop, where he is an apprentice. He spends the latter part of his day fixing punctures- making seventy rupees which helps light up the stove at home.

"Dost Ali's father drives around passengers in a donkey-cart for a living and his mother is a homemaker. They are hardly able to make ends meet," shares MS. Nasima, the principal at the TCF school. "Being the eldest son, his father arranged for him to learn a skill so he could lend him a hand. Despite working late in the evening, Dost Ali never misses a day at a school."

In the better part of the day, Dost Ali, a student of Class 3, spends his time learning, laughing, and playing at school. "I enjoy playing football and reading aloud int the class. When I grow up, I want to be a doctor," he shares with a sparkle in his eyes.



Education: Transforming Lives of Alumni

Growing up, Aqsa often saw her parents choose between buying food and paying her fees at a private school. But, they always prioritised education. Even as a child, she realised the value of her father's backbreaking work of manual labour and resolved to give her parents a better life for their sacrifices. But while she progressed at school, their income failed to keep up with the expenses.

A ray of hope emerged when a neighbour informed them about the TCF school in their vicinity, Bhittaiabad, Karachi. "I was startled to see the huge building and playground," Aqsa remembers her first visit to the TCF school, where she was later enrolled in Grade 6. "The teachers were attentive, and I really enjoyed participating in extra-curricular activities. But most of all, I was relieved that my education

wasn't a burden on my parents anymore," she reflects. During her time at TCF, Aqsa discovered her passion for the field of medicine and began the rigorous preparation that would eventually help her secure a place at Ziauddin University, Karachi.

"I didn't have the finances to pursue a 5-year degree. Once again, TCF stepped in and provided me a full scholarship," shares Aqsa.



Aqsa would rise early every morning and change multiple buses to get to university for her classes. In the evening, she gave tuitions so she could pay for her books and travel expenses. She would be up most nights studying to keep up with the demands of pursuing a medical profession.



Days of hard work turned into years and Aqsa finally completed her house job and graduated as a Doctor of Physical Therapy. She is the first girl in her family to have pursued tertiary education and become a doctor.

"My father's eyes were full of tears as he embraced me on the day of my graduation," Aqsa shares the heartfelt moment. "I was also very emotional as I realised that I was finally able to give him a break from a difficult life and years of sacrifice," she adds. **Alumni in Tertiary Education:** The following TCF Pakistan table depicts the TCF Alumni enrolled in tertiary education in diverse, specialized fields to date. The enrollment rate is higher for girls at 57% vs 43% for boys.

Third-Party Inspections of All Our Operated Schools

TCF Canada School inspections are executed by an independent third party appointed by TCF Canada for quality checks and identifying gaps for improvement for all schools operated/supported by us. IPSOS, a multinational market research and consulting firm has been conducting these inspections since 2019. The inspection is conducted independently through on-site visit/observation, teacher, and principal survey and through available bookkeeping resources. It covers facility observation, monitoring, principal feedback, and observer score with each school visited by an IPSOS evaluator/observer.

School Inspections answer crucial questions like:

- Is learning taking place?
- Are school spaces safe, maintained, and functional?
- Are amenities and hygiene taken care of?
- How is student and faculty attendance?
- Is the school policy compliant, in terms of class planning and scholarships available, teachers hired with merit, provision of uniforms, textbooks and books, and transport facility for teachers?
- What is the level of education satisfaction and student performance?


Highlights IPSOS Inspection 2022


In the spirit of receiving feedback to analyze programming, IPSOS inspection conducted in all our 150 schools showed us that our schools are overall doing exceedingly well and identified areas of further improvement.


IPSOS evaluation highlights several strengths covering physical infrastructure and resources to learning itself. The schools had 100% dedicated teachers and 95% principals present on the day of the visit. The education satisfaction level is at 99%. Cleanliness and maintenance of classrooms, playgrounds and libraries is prevalent in all, except a few of our schools where we intervened appropriately. The report provided important data/info for us to identify schools that have room for improvement. We continue sharing this data and review/discuss same with TCF Pakistan to further strengthen programming and operations of TCF Canada schools.



Impact Recognition



Revenue* Growth Over the Years

TCF Canada community met in-person with zeal and passion for the cause of education, after a hiatus of two COVID years, in our 2022 events, like Galas, while continuing with our virtual fundraising campaigns.



Our steady growth continuing through 2022 was possible with more people who joined our mission during the year and ones who have stayed with us year on year. It would not have been possible without the support of our donors and volunteers. We continued to see a steady growth in donors, within and outside the Pakistani Diaspora. We also found our steady volunteers, as always, standing shoulder to shoulder with us in events, through personal networks, person-to-person campaigns and support of TCF Canada's daily operations.

Learnings and Looking Ahead;

With the post-covid reopening of public engagement, the events saw growth in terms of number of donors and donations. Therefore, we are undergoing robust streamlining of processes for planning and execution to meet the needs of our expanding donor base and education related projects. We plan to have external auditors process school expenses, i.e, school builds and school operations expenses from year 2023.

The IPSOS inspection is followed up with better in-field school operations through information sharing, queries and improvement. We are working along with TCF in Pakistan to ensure that we improve our service each year to our schools and communities.

We plan to move from the local school boards (almost 15) to the Federal school board from year 2023 and expect to see a drop in the Grade 10 Pass rate as the latter has a more stringent and uniform assessment system and will test students with same standard throughout the country. We will continue to aim to improve our passing rate going forward.
